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About This Document

This document introduces PanoVu series network camera, including 360° panoramic + PTZ camera, 180° panoramic + PTZ camera, and 360° panoramic camera. It covers how to activate and access to the camera, and operate the camera in the network environment.

Overview of Contents

This document contains the following chapters, sections and appendixes:

- **Chapter1 Activating and Accessing to the Camera** provides procedures for setting network environment, activating and accessing the camera by web browsers and client software, and introduces the power-up action.
- **Chapter2 Setting Local Parameters and Network** suggests the basic settings, including viewing device local information, configuring saving paths of files, network settings, and other settings.
- **Chapter3 Live View** describes how to view video and configure the available settings for the camera via web browser.
- **Chapter4 PTZ Control** describes the PTZ function of camera, including preset, patrol, and pattern. It also suggests the PTZ configurations, such as PTZ limits, initial position, and park actions, etc..
- **Chapter5 Storage and Playback** introduces how to set the storage, set the recording schedule and capture schedule to trigger the recording and capture by events, and how to view the pictures and play back the saved video files.
- **Chapter6** Alarm and Events explains how to configure the camera to respond to alarm events, and make the events to trigger alarm actions.
- **Chapter7 Maintenance** describes how to set the system settings, security settings and user management, including time settings, RS-485 settings, and DST settings, etc.
- **Appendix** describes the SADP software, surge protection and details, attention of waterproof measurements and bubble maintenance, RS-485 bus connection details, wire gauge standards and transmission distance, and alarm in/out connections, etc.

Notice

The Camera 1 is the PTZ channel, and the Camera 2 and Camera 3 are the panoramic view channels. All PTZ functions, including privacy mask, and ROI function are only supported by Camera 1.

Chapter 1 Activating and Accessing to the Camera

1.1 System Requirement

System requirements of web browser accessing are as follows:

Operating System: Microsoft Windows XP SP1 and above version/Vista/Win7/Server 2003/Server 2008

CPU: Intel Pentium IV 3.0 GHz or higher

RAM: 1G or higher

Display: 1024 × 768 resolution or higher

Web Browser: Internet Explorer 8.0 and above version, Apple Safari 5.02 and above version, Mozilla

Firefox 5 and above version and Google Chrome 18 and above versions.

1.2 Activating the Camera

1.2.1 Setting the Camera over the LAN

Purpose:

To view and configure the camera via the LAN, you need to connect the camera in the same subnet with your computer, and install the SADP or client software to search and change the IP address of the camera.

Note:

For the detailed introduction of SADP, refer to Appendix 1.

The following figures show the two ways of cable connection of a camera and a computer:

Purpose:




Figure 1-1 Connecting Directly

- To test the camera, you can directly connect the camera to the computer with a network cable as shown in Figure 1-1.




Figure 1-2 Connecting via an Switch or a Router

- Refer to Figure 1-2 to set the camera over the LAN via a switch or a router.

1.2.2 Activating the Camera

Purpose:

You are required to activate the camera first before you can use the camera.

Activation via web browser, activation via SADP, and activation via client software are supported. In the following sections, activation via web browser and activation via SADP will be taken as examples. You may refer to the user manual of the camera for details of activation via client software.

◆ Activation via Web Browser

Steps:

- 1. Power on the camera, and connect the camera to the network.
- 2. Input the IP address into the address bar of the web browser, and click **Enter** to enter the activation interface.

Note:

The default IP address of the camera is 192.168.1.64.




Figure 1-3 Activation Interface (Web Browser)

3. Create a password and input the password into the password field.

- 4. Confirm the password.
- 5. Click **OK** to activate the camera and enter the live view interface.

Activation via SADP Software

SADP software is used for detecting the online device, activating the device, and resetting the password.

Get the SADP software from the supplied disk or the official website, and install the SADP software according to the prompts. Follow the steps to activate the camera.

Steps:

- 1. Run the SADP software to search the online devices.
- 2. Check the device status from the device list, and select an inactive device.




Figure 1-4 SADP Interface

3. Create a password and input the password in the password field, and confirm the password.

password of your own choosing (Using a minimum of 8 characters, including at least three of the following categories: upper case letters, lower case letters, numbers, and special characters.) in order to increase the security of your product. And we recommend you reset your password regularly, especially in the high security system, resetting the password monthly or weekly can better protect your product.

4. Click **OK** to save the password.

You can check whether the activation is completed on the popup window. If activation failed, make sure that the password meets the requirement and then try again.

5. Change the device IP address to the same subnet with your computer by either modifying the IP address manually or checking the **Enable DHCP** checkbox.




Figure 1-5 Modify the IP Address

6. Input the password and click **Save** to activate your IP address modification.

◆ Activation via Client Software

The client software is versatile video management software for multiple kinds of devices. Get the client software from the supplied disk or the official website, and install the software according to the prompts. Follow the steps to activate the camera.

Steps:

1. Run the client software and the control panel of the software pops up, as shown in the figure below.




Figure 1-6 Control Panel

2. Click **Device Management** to enter the Device Management interface, as shown in the figure below.




Figure 1-7 Device Management Interface

- 3. Check the device status from the device list, and select an inactive device.
- 4. Click **Activate** to pop up the Activation interface.
- 5. Create a password and input the password in the password field, and confirm the password.

6. Click **OK** to start activation.

Click Modify Netinfo to pop up the Network Parameter Modification interface, as shown in the figure below.




Figure 1-9 Modifying the Network Parameters

- 8. Change the device IP address to the same subnet with your computer by either modifying the IP address manually or checking the **Enable DHCP** checkbox.
- 9. Input the password to activate your IP address modification.

1.3 Setting the Camera over the WAN (Optional)

Purpose:

This section explains how to connect the camera to the WAN with a static IP or a dynamic IP.

1.3.1 Static IP Connection

Before you start:

Apply a static IP from an ISP (Internet Service Provider). With the static IP address, you can connect the camera via a router or connect it to the WAN directly.

Connecting the camera via a router

Steps:

- 1. Connect the camera to the router.
- 2. Assign a LAN IP address, the subnet mask and the gateway. Refer to **Section 1.2 Activating the Camera** for detailed IP address configuration of the camera.
- 3. Save the static IP in the router.
- 4. Set port mapping, E.g., 80, 8000 and 554 ports. The steps for port mapping vary depending on different routers. Call the router manufacturer for assistance with port mapping.

Note:

Refer to Appendix 2 for detailed information about port mapping.

5. Visit the camera through a web browser or the client software over the internet.




Figure 1-10 Accessing the Camera through Router with Static IP

♦ Connecting the camera with static IP directly

You can also save the static IP in the camera and directly connect it to the internet without using a router. Refer to **Section 1.2 Activating the Camera** for detailed IP address configuration of the camera.




Figure 1-11 Accessing the Camera with Static IP Directly

1.3.2 Dynamic IP Connection

Before you start:

Apply a dynamic IP from an ISP. With the dynamic IP address, you can connect the camera to a modem or a router.

Connecting the camera via a router

Steps:

- 1. Connect the camera to the router.
- 2. In the camera, assign a LAN IP address, the subnet mask and the gateway. Refer to **Section 1.2 Activating the Camera** for detailed LAN configuration.
- 3. In the router, set the PPPoE user name, password and confirm the password.



- For your privacy and to better protect your system against security risks, we strongly recommend the use of strong passwords for all functions and network devices. The password should be something of your own choosing (Using a minimum of 8 characters, including at least three of the following categories: upper case letters, lower case letters, numbers, and special characters.) in order to increase the security of your product.
- Proper configuration of all passwords and other security settings is the responsibility of the installer and/or end-user.
- 4. Set port mapping. E.g. 80, 8000 and 554 ports. The steps for port mapping vary depending on different routers. Call the router manufacturer for assistance with port mapping.

Note:

Refer to Appendix 2 for detailed information about port mapping.

- 5. Apply a domain name from a domain name provider.
- 6. Configure the DDNS settings in the setting interface of the router.
- 7. Visit the camera via the applied domain name.
- Connecting the camera via a modem

Purpose:

This camera supports the PPPoE auto dial-up function. The camera gets a public IP address by ADSL dial-up after the camera is connected to a modem. You need to configure the PPPoE parameters of the camera. Refer to *Section 2.2.1 Basic Settings - Configuring PPPoE Settings* for detailed configuration.




Figure 1-12 Accessing the Camera with Dynamic IP

Note:

The obtained IP address is dynamically assigned via PPPoE, so the IP address always changes after rebooting the camera. To solve the inconvenience of the dynamic IP, you need to get a domain name from the DDNS provider (E.g. DynDns.com). Follow the steps below for normal domain name resolution and private domain name resolution to solve the problem.

Normal Domain Name Resolution




Figure 1-13 Normal Domain Name Resolution

Steps:

- 1. Apply a domain name from a domain name provider.
- 2. Configure the DDNS settings in the **DDNS Settings** interface of the camera. Refer to **Section 2.2.1 Basic Settings Configuring DDNS Settings** for detailed configuration.
- 3. Visit the camera via the applied domain name.

1.4 Accessing to the Camera

1.4.1 Accessing by Web Browsers

Steps:

- 1. Open the web browser.
- 2. In the address field, input the IP address of the camera, e.g., 192.168.1.64 and click **Enter** to enter the login interface.

- 3. If you activate the camera for the first time using, refer to the **Section 1.2 Activating the Camera**.
- 4. Select English as the interface language on the top-right of login interface.
- 5. Input the user name and password and click

The admin user should configure the device accounts and user/operator permissions properly. Delete the unnecessary accounts and user/operator permissions.

Note:

The device IP address gets locked if the admin user performs 7 failed password attempts (5 attempts for the user/operator).




Figure 1-14 Login Interface

1.4.2 Accessing by Client Software

The product CD contains the client software. You can view the live video and manage the camera with the client software.

Follow the installation prompts to install the client software and. The configuration interface and live view interface of client software are shown below.




Figure 1-15 iVMS-4200 Control Panel




Figure 1-16 iVMS-4200 Live View Interface

Notes:

- If you use third party VMS software, contact technical support of our branch for camera firmware.
- For detailed information about client software of our company, refer to the user manual of the software. This manual mainly introduces accessing to the camera by web browser.

1.5 Power-up Action




Figure 1-17 Power-up Information

After the power is applied, the camera will perform self-test actions. It begins with lens actions and then pan and tilt movement. After the power-up self-test actions, the information shown in Figure 1-17 will be displayed on screen for 40 seconds.

The system information displayed on the screen includes the camera model, address, protocol, version and other information. The COMMUNICATION refers to the baud rate, parity, data bit and stop bit of the camera. e.g., "2400, N, 8, 1" indicates the camera is configured with the baud rate of 2400, no parity, 8 data bits and 1 stop bit.

Chapter 2 Setting Local Parameters and Network

2.1 Configuring Local Parameters

Note:

The local configuration refers to the parameters of the live view and other operations using the web browser.

Steps:

Enter the Local configuration interface:

Configuration > Local




Figure 2-1 Local Configuration Interface

- 2. Configure the following settings:
- ◆ Live View Parameters: Set the protocol type, play performance, rules, and image format.
 - **Protocol:** TCP, UDP, MULTICAST and HTTP are selectable.

TCP: Ensures complete delivery of streaming data and better video quality, yet the real-time transmission will be affected.

UDP: Provides real-time audio and video streams.

MULTICAST: It's recommended to select the protocol type to Multicast when using the Multicast function. For other information about Multicast, refer to **Section 2.2.1 Basic Settings** -

Configuring TCP/IP Settings.

HTTP: Allows the same quality as of TCP without setting specific ports for streaming under some network environments.

- Play Performance: Set the live view performance to Shortest Delay, Balanced or Fluent.
- Rules: You can enable or disable the rules of dynamic analysis for events here.

- **Display POS Information:** Enable the function, feature information of the detected target is dynamically displayed near the target in the live image.
- Image Format: The captured pictures can be saved in different format. JPEG and BMP are available.
- Record File Settings: Set the saving path of the video files.
 - Record File Size: Select the packed size of manually recorded and downloaded video files. The size can be set to 256M, 512M or 1G.
 - Save record files to: Set the saving path for the manually recorded video files.
 - Save downloaded files to: Set the saving path for the downloaded video files in interface.

Playback

- Picture and Clip Settings: Set the saving paths of the captured pictures and clipped video files.
 - Save snapshots in live view to: Set the saving path of the manually captured pictures in



• Save snapshots when playback to: Set the saving path of the captured pictures in



• Save clips to: Set the saving path of the clipped video files in



Note:

You can click Browse to change the directory for saving video files, clips and pictures.

3. Click to save the settings.

2.2 Configuring Network Settings

2.2.1 Basic Settings

Configuring TCP/IP Settings

Purpose:

TCP/IP settings must be properly configured before you operate the camera over network. IPv4 and IPv6 are both supported.

Steps:

1. Enter TCP/IP settings interface:

Configuration > Network > Basic Settings > TCP/IP




Figure 2-2 TCP/IP Settings

- 2. Configure the basic network settings, including the NIC Type, IPv4 or IPv6 Address, IPv4 or IPv6 Subnet Mask, IPv4 or IPv6 Default Gateway, MTU settings and Multicast Address.
- (Optional) Check the Enable Multicast Discovery checkbox, and then the online network camera can be automatically detected by client software via private multicast protocol in the LAN.
- 4. Configure the DNS server. Input the preferred DNS server, and alternate DNS server.
- 5. Click to save the above settings.

Notes:

- The valid value range of MTU is 1280 ~ 1500.
- The Multicast sends a stream to the multicast group address and allows multiple clients to acquire
 the stream at the same time by requesting a copy from the multicast group address. Before
 utilizing this function, you have to enable the Multicast function of your router.
- Reboot the device before the settings take effect.

Configuring DDNS Settings

Purpose:

If your camera is set to use PPPoE as its default network connection, you can use the Dynamic DNS (DDNS) for network access.

Before you start:

Registration on the DDNS server is required before configuring the DDNS settings of the camera.



• For your privacy and to better protect your system against security risks, we strongly recommend the use of strong passwords for all functions and network devices. The password should be something of your own choosing (Using a minimum of 8 characters, including at least three of

the following categories: upper case letters, lower case letters, numbers, and special characters.) in order to increase the security of your product.

• Proper configuration of all passwords and other security settings is the responsibility of the installer and/or end-user.

Steps:

1. Enter the DDNS settings interface:

Configuration > Network > Basic Settings > DDNS

- 2. Check the **Enable DDNS** checkbox to enable this feature.
- 3. Select **DDNS Type**. Two DDNS types are selectable: DynDNS and NO-IP.
 - DynDNS:

Steps:

- (1) Input **Server Address** of DynDNS (e.g. members.dyndns.org).
- (2) In the **Domain** text field, input the domain name obtained from the DynDNS website.
- (3) Input the **Port** of DynDNS server.
- (4) Input the **User Name** and **Password** registered on the DynDNS website.
- (5) Click to save the settings.




Figure 2-4 DynDNS Settings

NO-IP:

Steps:

- (1) Input Server Address of NO-IP.
- (2) In the **Domain** text field, input the domain name obtained from the NO-IP website.
- (3) Input the **Port** of NO-IP server.
- (4) Input the **User Name** and **Password** registered on the NO-IP website.
- (5) Click to save the settings.

Configuring PPPoE Settings

Purpose:

If you have no router but only a modem, you can use Point-to-Point Protocol over Ethernet (PPPoE) function.

Steps:

1. Enter the PPPoE settings interface:

Configuration > Network > Basic Settings > PPPoE

- 2. Check the **Enable PPPoE** checkbox to enable this feature.
- 3. Input User Name, Password, and Confirm password for PPPoE access.

Note:

The User Name and Password should be assigned by your ISP.

The password should be something of your own choosing (Using a minimum of 8 characters, including at least three of the following categories: upper case letters, lower case letters, numbers, and special characters.) in order to increase the security of your product.
- Proper configuration of all passwords and other security settings is the responsibility of the installer and/or end-user.
- 4. Click



to save and exit the interface.

Configuring Port Settings

Purpose:

If there is a router and you want to access the camera through Wide Area Network (WAN), you need to forward the 3 ports for the camera.

Steps:

1. Enter the Port settings interface:

Configuration > Network > Basic Settings > Port




Figure 2-6 Port Settings

Set the HTTP port, RTSP port, HTTPS port and port of the camera.

HTTP Port: The default port number is 80. RTSP Port: The default port number is 554. HTTPS Port: The default port number is 443. Server Port: The default port number is 8000.

3. Click to save the settings.

Configuring NAT (Network Address Translation) Settings

Purpose:

Universal Plug and Play (UPnP™) is a networking architecture that provides compatibility among networking equipment, software and other hardware devices. The UPnP protocol allows devices to connect seamlessly and to simplify the implementation of networks in the house and corporate environments.

With the function enabled, you don't need to configure the port mapping for each port, and the camera is connected to the Wide Area Network via the router.

Steps:

- 1. Enter the NAT settings interface by
 - Configuration > Network > Basic Settings > NAT
- 2. Check the ☑ Enable UPnP™ checkbox to enable the UPnP™ function.
- 3. Set the port mapping mode:

To port mapping with the default port numbers:



To port mapping with the customized port numbers:



And you can customize the value of the port No. by yourself.




Figure 2-7 Configure the Port No.

4. Click to save the settings.

2.2.2 Advanced Settings

Configuring SNMP Settings

Purpose:

You can use SNMP to get camera status and parameters related information.

Before you start:

Before setting the SNMP, use the SNMP software and manage to receive the camera information via SNMP port. By setting the Trap Address, the camera can send the alarm event and exception messages to the surveillance center.

Note:

The SNMP version you select should be the same as that of the SNMP software.

Steps:

1. Enter the SNMP settings interface:

Configuration > Network > Advanced Settings > SNMP




Figure 2-8 SNMP Settings

- 2. Check the corresponding version checkbox (Enable SNMP v1, Enable SNMP v2c, Enable SNMP v3) to enable the feature.
- 3. Configure the SNMP settings.

Note:

The configuration of the SNMP software should be the same as the settings you configure here.

4. Click to save and finish the settings.

Configuring FTP Settings

Purpose:

You can set a FTP server and configure the following parameters for uploading captured pictures. **Steps:**

1. Enter the FTP settings interface:

Configuration > Network > Advanced Settings > FTP




Figure 2-9 FTP Settings

2. Configure the FTP settings, including server address, port, user name, password, directory, and upload type.



- For your privacy and to better protect your system against security risks, we strongly recommend the use of strong passwords for all functions and network devices. The password should be something of your own choosing (Using a minimum of 8 characters, including at least three of the following categories: upper case letters, lower case letters, numbers, and special characters.) in order to increase the security of your product.
- Proper configuration of all passwords and other security settings is the responsibility of the installer and/or end-user.

The server address supports both the domain name and IP address formats.

- Setting the directory in FTP server for saving files:
 In the Directory Structure field, you can select the root directory, parent directory and child directory.
 - **Root directory**: The files will be saved in the root of FTP server.




Figure 2-10 Parent Directory

 - **Parent directory**: The files will be saved in a folder in FTP server. The name of folder can be defined as shown in following Figure 2-10.




Figure 2-11 Child Directory

• **Child directory**: It is a sub-folder which can be created in the parent directory. The files will be saved in a sub-folder in FTP server. The name of folder can be defined as shown in following Figure 2-11.

- Upload type: To enable uploading the captured picture to the FTP server.
- 3. Click to save the settings.

Note:

If you want to upload the captured pictures to FTP server, you also have to enable the continuous snapshot or event-triggered snapshot in **Snapshot** interface. For detailed information, refer to the **Section 5.1.4 Configuring Capture Schedule.**

Configuring Email Settings

Purpose:

The system can be configured to send an Email notification to all designated receivers if an alarm event is detected, e.g., motion detection event, video tampering, etc.

Before you start:

Configure the DNS Server settings under **Configuration > Network > Basic Settings > TCP/IP** before using the Email function.

Steps:

1. Enter the Email settings interface:

Configuration > Network > Advanced Settings > Email




Figure 2-12 Email Settings

2. Configure the following settings:

Sender: The name of the email sender.

Sender's Address: The email address of the sender.

SMTP Server: The SMTP Server IP address or host name (e.g., smtp.263xmail.com).

SMTP Port: The SMTP port. The default TCP/IP port for SMTP is 25.

E-mail Encryption: Email encryption can be selected among None, SSL, and TLS. When you select SSL or TLS and disable STARTTLS, e-mails will be sent after encrypted by SSL or TLS. The SMTP port

should be set as 465 for this encryption method. When you select SSL or TLS and enable STARTTLS, emails will be sent after encrypted by STARTTLS, and the SMTP port should be set as 25.

Note:

If you want to use STARTTLS, make sure that the protocol is supported by your e-mail server. If you check the Enable STARTTLS checkbox when the protocol is not supported by your e-mail sever, your e-mail will not be encrypted.

Authentication (optional): If your email server requires authentication, check this checkbox to use authentication to log in to this server and input the login user name and password.

Receiver: Input the receiver to which the email is sent.

Receiver's Address: The email address of user to be notified.

Note:

You can click to check whether the setting is invalid after the required parameters are configured.

3. Click to save the settings.

Configuring HTTPS Settings

Purpose:

HTTPS provides authentication of the web site and associated web server that one is communicating with, which protects against Man-in-the-middle attacks. Perform the following steps to set the port number of https.

Example:

If you set the port number as 443 and the IP address is 192.168.1.64, you may access the device by inputting https://192.168.1.64:443 via the web browser.

Steps:

1. Enter the HTTPS settings interface.

Configuration > Network > Advanced Settings > HTTPS

2. Create the self-signed certificate or authorized certificate.




Figure 2-14 Create Self-signed Certificate

- After receiving the signed valid certificate, import the certificate to the device.
- 5) Click **OK** to save the settings.
- 3. There will be the certificate information after you successfully create and install the certificate.




Figure 2-15 Installed Certificate Property

Configuring QoS Settings

Purpose:

QoS (Quality of Service) can help solve the network delay and network congestion by configuring the priority of data sending.

Steps:

1. Enter the QoS settings interface:

Configuration > Network > Advanced Settings > QoS

- 2. Configure the QoS settings, including video/audio DSCP, event/alarm DSCP and Management DSCP. The valid DSCP value ranges from 0 to 63. The DSCP value is bigger, the priority is higher.
- 3. Click to save the settings.

Notes:

- Make sure that you enable the QoS function of your network device (such as a router).
- Reboot the device before the settings take effect.

Configuring 802.1X Settings

Purpose:

The camera supports IEEE 802.1X standard.

IEEE 802.1X is a port-based network access control. It enhances the security level of the LAN. When devices connect to this network with IEEE 802.1X standard, the authentication is needed. If the authentication fails, the devices don't connect to the network.

The protected LAN with 802.1X standard is shown as follows:




Figure 2-17 Protected LAN

- Before connecting the network camera to the protected LAN, apply a digital certificate from a Certificate Authority.
- The network camera requests access to the protected LAN via the authenticator (a switch).
- The switch forwards the identity and password to the authentication server (RADIUS server).
- The switch forwards the certificate of authentication server to the network camera.
- If all the information is validated, the switch allows the network access to the protected network.



- For your privacy and to better protect your system against security risks, we strongly recommend the use of strong passwords for all functions and network devices. The password should be something of your own choosing (Using a minimum of 8 characters, including at least three of the following categories: upper case letters, lower case letters, numbers, and special characters.) in order to increase the security of your product.
- Proper configuration of all passwords and other security settings is the responsibility of the installer and/or end-user.

Steps:

- 1. Connect the network camera to your PC directly with a network cable.
- Enter the 802.1X settings interface:

Configuration > Network > Advanced Settings > 802.1X

- 3. Check the Enable IEEE 802.1X checkbox to enable it.
- 4. Configure the 802.1X settings, including user name and password.

Note:

The EAP-MD5 version must be identical with that of the router or the switch.

5. Click to finish the settings.

Note:

The camera reboots when you save the settings.

6. After the configuration, connect the camera to the protected network.

Integration Protocol

If you need to access to the camera through the third party platform, you can enable CGI function. And if you need to access to the device through ONVIF protocol, you can configure ONVIF user in this interface. Refer to ONVIF standard for detailed configuration rules.

Note:

Supported protocols may be different among camera models.

CGI

Check the **Enable** *****CGI** checkbox and then select the authentication from the drop-down list. Then you can access to the camera through the third party platform.

ONVIF

Steps:

- 1. Check the **Enable ONVIF** checkbox to enable the function.
- 2. Click **Add** to add a new ONVIF user. Set the user name and password, and confirm the password. You can set the user as media user, operator, and administrator.
- 3. Click Modify to modify the information of the added ONVIF user.

- 4. Click **Delete** to delete the selected ONVIF user.
- 5. Save the settings.

Note:

User settings of ONVIF are cleared when you restore the camera.

Chapter 3 Live View

3.1 Install the Plug-in

Install the plug-in before viewing the live video and operating the camera. Follow the installation prompts to install the plug-in.




Figure 3-1 Download and Install Plug-in

3.2 Live View Page

3.2.1 Descriptions of the live view page:

Menu Bar:

Click each tab to enter Live View, Playback, Picture, and Configuration page respectively.

Click to display the help file of the camera.

Click be to logout the system.

Live View Window:

Display the live video.

Toolbar:

Operations on the live view page, e.g., live view, capture, record, audio on/off, regional exposure, regional focus, etc.

PTZ Control:

Panning, tilting, focusing and zooming actions of the camera. The lighter, wiper, one-touch focus and lens initialization control.

Preset/patrol/pattern:

Set and call the preset/patrol/pattern for the camera.

Live View Parameters:

Configure the window division, image size, stream type, plug-in type, and two-way audio of the live video.

3.2.2 Live View Operation

Purpose:

The live video page allows you to view live video, capture images, realize PTZ control, set/call presets and configure video parameters.

Log in the camera to enter the live view page, or you can click **Live View** on the menu bar of the main page to enter the live view page.

Starting Live View

Click on the toolbar to start the live view of all channels of the network camera. Live view page of panoramic + PTZ camera and panoramic camera are different as shown below.





Figure 3-3 Start Live View (Panoramic + PTZ Camera)




The auxiliary functions include light, wiper, auxiliary focus, lens initialization, manual tracking, 3D positioning, one-touch patrol, and one-touch park.

- 2. Operate the 3D positioning function:
- Left click a position of the live video. The corresponding position will be moved to the center of the live video.

To use manual face capture, you should configure **Face Capture** function first. Go to **Configuration > Face Capture**. The function is only available for certain camera models.

3.3 Configuring Image Settings

3.3.1 Configuring Display Settings

Purpose:

You can set the image quality of the camera, including brightness, contrast, saturation, sharpness, etc.

Notes:

- The parameters in Display Settings interface vary depending on different camera models.
- You can double click the live view to enter full screen mode and double click it again to exit.

Steps:

1. Enter the Display Settings interface:

Configuration > Image> Display Settings

- 2. Select channel No. of the camera.
- 3. You can select the **Mounting Scenario** from the dropdown list with different predefined image parameters.
- 4. Set the image parameters of the camera.




Figure 3-5 Display Settings

Image Adjustment

Brightness

This feature is used to adjust brightness of the image. The value ranges from 0 to 100.

Contrast

This feature enhances the difference in color and light between parts of an image. The value ranges from 0 to 100.

Saturation

This feature is used to adjust color saturation of the image. The value ranges from 0 to 100.

Sharpness

Sharpness function enhances the detail of the image by sharpening the edges in the image. The value ranges from 0 to 100.

Exposure Settings

Exposure Mode

The Exposure Mode can be set to Auto, Iris Priority, Shutter Priority, and Manual.

Auto:

The iris, shutter and gain values will be adjusted automatically according to the brightness of the environment.

Iris Priority:

The value of iris needs to be adjusted manually. The shutter and gain values will be adjusted automatically according to the brightness of the environment.




Figure 3-6 Manual Iris

Shutter Priority:

The value of shutter needs to be adjusted manually. The iris and gain values will be adjusted automatically according to the brightness of the environment.




Figure 3-7 Manual Shutter

• Manual:

In Manual mode, you can adjust the values of Gain, Shutter, Iris manually.

Note:

This function varies depending on different camera models.

Limit Gain

This feature is used to adjust gain of the image. The value ranges from 0 to 100.

Slow Shutter

This function can be used in underexposure condition. It lengthens the shutter time to ensure full exposure. Select slow shutter level from the dropdown list

Focus Settings

Focus Mode

The Focus Mode can be set to Auto, Manual, Semi-auto.

• Auto:

The camera focuses automatically at any time according to objects in the scene.

Semi-auto:

The camera focuses automatically only once after panning, tilting and zooming.

Manual:

In **Manual** mode, you need to use on the control panel to focus manually.

Min. Focus Distance

This function is used to limit the minimum focus distance.

Note:

Focus settings applies only to PTZ camera channel.

Day/Night Switch

Day/Night Switch

The Day/Night Switch mode can be set to Auto, Day, Night, and Scheduled-Switch.

• Auto:

In **Auto** mode, the day mode and night mode can switch automatically according to the light condition of environment. The switching sensitivity can be set to **Low**, **Normal**, **High**.

Day:

In **Day** mode, the camera displays color image. It is used for normal lighting conditions.

Night

In **Night** mode, the image is black and white. **Night** mode can increase the sensitivity in low light conditions.

Scheduled-Switch

In **Scheduled-Switch** mode, you can set the time schedule for day mode as shown in Figure 3-10. The rest time out of the schedule is for night mode.

Smart Supplement Light

If the light supplement is on and the image center is overexposure, you can enable this function.

IR Light Mode

IR light mode can be set to Auto and Manual.

- Auto: The brightness of the infrared light will be adjusted automatically. IR Light Sensitivity
 value ranges from 0 to 100. Trigger Mode can be set to Camera or Photosensitive.
- Manual: you need to adjust the brightness value of infrared light manually. Brightness Limit value ranges from 0 to 100.

Notes:

- This function varies depending on different camera models.
- The IR related functions are supported by the IR camera only.
- For detailed parameters configuration of IR light, you can enter the OSD menu by calling the special preset 95.

- When the IR Light Mode is auto, the day/night mode is adjusted automatically according to the IR Light Mode. Manually setting the day/night mode is invalid.
- When the IR Light Mode is manual and the Brightness Limit is 0, you can set the day/night mode manually.
- When the IR Light Mode is manual and the Brightness Limit is not 0, the night mode is set as the
 default mode. Manually setting the day/night mode is invalid.

Backlight Settings

BLC (Back Light Compensation)

If there's a bright backlight, the subject in front of the backlight appears silhouetted or dark. Enabling **BLC** (back light compensation) function can correct the exposure of the subject. But the backlight environment is washed out to white.

WDR (Wide Dynamic Range)




Figure 3-11 WDR

The wide dynamic range (WDR) function helps the camera provide clear images even under back light circumstances. When there are both very bright and very dark areas simultaneously in the field of view, WDR balances the brightness level of the whole image and provide clear images with details. You can enable or disable the WDR function as shown in Figure 3-11. The wide dynamic level ranges from 0 to 100.

Note:

This function varies depending on different camera models.

HLC

HLC (High Light Compensation) makes the camera identify and suppress the strong light sources that usually flare across a scene. This makes it possible to see the detail of the image that would normally be hidden.

White Balance

The White Balance mode can be set to Auto, MWB, Outdoor, Indoor, Fluorescent Lamp, Sodium Lamp and Auto-Tracking.

Auto

In **Auto** mode, the camera retains color balance automatically according to the current color temperature.

MWB




Figure 3-12 Manual White Balance

In **MWB** (Manual White Balance) mode, you can adjust the color temperature manually to meet your own demand as shown in Figure 3-12.

Outdoor

You can select this mode when the camera is installed in outdoor environment.

Indoor

You can select this mode when the camera is installed in indoor environment.

Fluorescent Lamp

You can select this mode when there are fluorescent lamps installed near the camera.

Sodium Lamp

You can select this mode when there are sodium lamps installed near the camera.

Auto-Tracking

In **Auto-Tracking** mode, white balance is continuously being adjusted in real-time according to the color temperature of the scene illumination.

Image Enhancement

Digital Noise Reduction

The digital noise reduces function processes the noise in the video signal.

You can set **Digital Noise Reduction** function to **Normal** and adjust the **Noise Reduction Level** as shown in Figure 3-13. The level ranges from 0 to 100.

If you are a professional technician, you can set it to Expert Mode then adjust Space DNR Level and Time DNR Level.




Figure 3-14 Expert Mode

Defog Mode

When there is fog in the image, you can enable this function to get clear image.

EIS (Electronic Image Stabilization)

The live view image would be trembled and dim when the camera is shocked slightly in some monitoring conditions. And the electronic image stabilization (EIS) function is used to overcome this problem to ensure a steady and clear image.

OIS (Optical Image Stabilization)

You can set the OIS (Optical Image Stabilization) to NORMAL, EXPERT, or OFF as you need. In expert mode, you can specify OIS level and OIS Sensitivity.

Video Adjustment

Mirror

If you turn the **MIRROR** function on, the image will be flipped. It is like the image in the mirror. The flip direction can be set to OFF, or CENTER.

Video Standard

You can set the **Video Standard** to 50 Hz (PAL) or 60 Hz (NTSC) according to the video system in your country.

Capture Mode:

The **Capture Mode** can be selected from the list.

Other

Lens Initialization

The lens operates the movements for initialization when you check the **Lens Initialization** checkbox.

Zoom Limit

You can set **Zoom Limit** value to limit the maximum value of zooming. The value can be selected from the list.

Note:

Lens Initialization and Zoom Limit functions are supported by Camera 1 only.

Local Output

Turn on local output, you can output the video to a monitor via analog signal.

3.3.2 Configuring OSD Settings

Purpose:

OSD (On-screen Display) refers to the camera name, time/date, customized information displayed on the live view.

Note:

This function varies according to different camera models.

Steps

1. Enter the OSD settings interface:

Configuration > Image > OSD Settings




Figure 3-15 OSD Settings

- 2. Check the corresponding checkbox to select the display of camera name, date or week if required.
- 3. Edit the camera name in the text field of Camera Name.
- 4. Select from the dropdown list to set the time format, date format and display mode.
- 5. You can use the mouse to drag the text frame IPdome in the live view window to adjust the OSD position.

Purpose:

You can customize the text overlay.

Steps:

- 1. Enter the Text Overlay settings interface:
 - **Configuration > Image > OSD Settings**

- 3. Input the characters in the textbox.
- 4. Use the mouse to drag the red text frame Text in the live view window to adjust the text overlay position.

Note:

There are up to 8 text overlays configurable.

3.3.4 Configuring Privacy Mask

Purpose:

Privacy Mask enables you to cover certain areas on the live video to prevent certain spots in the surveillance area from being live viewed and recorded.

Steps:

- 1. Enter the Privacy Mask Settings interface:
 - **Configuration > Image > Privacy Mask**
- 2. Check the checkbox of **Enable Privacy Mask** to enable this function.
- 3. Click Draw Area.
- 4. Click and drag the mouse in the live video window to draw the mask area.
- 5. Click **Stop Drawing** to finish drawing or click **Clear All** to clear all of the areas you set without saving them
- 6. Click Save to save the settings.

3.4 Configuring Video and Audio Settings

Note:

Before you adjust the parameters, select the camera channel No. from the dropdown list.

3.4.1 Configuring Video Settings

Steps:

1. Enter the Video settings interface:

Configuration > Video/Audio > Video




Figure 3-18 Configure Video Settings

2. Select the **Stream Type** of the camera to Main Stream (Normal), Sub-Stream or Third Stream.

Note

The main stream is usually for recording and live viewing with good bandwidth, and the sub-stream can be used for live viewing when the bandwidth is limited. Refer to the **Section 2.1 Configuring Local Parameters** for switching the stream type for live viewing.

3. You can customize the following parameters for the selected stream:

Video Type:

Select the stream type to video stream, or video & audio composite stream. The audio signal will be recorded only when the **Video Type** is **Video & Audio**.

Resolution:

Select the resolution of the video output.

Bitrate Type:

Select the bitrate type to constant or variable.

Video Quality:

When bitrate type is selected as **Variable**, 6 levels of video quality are selectable.

Frame Rate:

The frame rate is to describe the frequency at which the video stream is updated and it is measured by frames per second (fps). A higher frame rate is advantageous when there is movement in the video stream, as it maintains image quality throughout.

Max. Bitrate:

Set the max. bitrate. The higher value corresponds to the higher video quality, and the higher bandwidth is required as well.

Video Encoding:

Select the Video Encoding standard for each camera.

Profile

You can set the profile level to **High Profile**, **Main Profile** or **Basic Profile**.

I Frame Interval:

Set the I-Frame interval from 1 to 400.

SVC:

SVC is a video encoding technology. It extracts frames from the original video and sends these frames to a video recorder which also supports SVC function when the network bandwidth is insufficient.

Smoothing:

Drag to adjust the value of video smoothing on your demand.

Resolution Mode:

Resolution of the panoramic view channels are different in different resulption mode (including main stream, sub-stream and third stream). Select the resulption mode from the dropdown list on your demand.

Notes:

- The function is only supported by Camera 2 and Camera 3.
- Reboot the device before it takes effect when the resolution mode is switched.
- Redraw the rule area if the resolution mode is switched.
- 4. Click to save the settings.

Note:

Video settings vary depending on different camera models.

3.4.2 Configuring Audio Settings

Steps:

- 1. Enter the Audio settings interface
 - Configuration > Video/Audio > Audio
- 2. Configure the following settings.

Audio Encoding: G.722.1, G.711ulaw, G.711alaw, MP2L2, PCM and G.726 selectable.

Audio Stream Bitrate: When the Audio Encoding is selected as MP2L2, you can configure the Audio Stream Bitrate in the dropdown list. The greater the value is, the better the audio quality will be.

Sampling Rate: When the Audio Encoding is selected as MP2L2 or PCM, you can configure the Sampling Rate in the dropdown list. The greater the value is, the better the audio quality will be.

Audio Input: When an intercom is connected to the camera, you need to set this option to LineIn.

When a microphone is connected to the camera, you need to set this option to MicIn.

Input Volume: Slid the bar to turn up/down the volume. The value ranges from 0 to 100.

Environmental Noise Filter: When the monitoring environment is very noisy, you can enable this function to reduce part of the noise.

3. Click to save the settings.

3.4.3 Configuring ROI Settings

Before you start:

ROI (Region of Interest) encoding is used to enhance the quality of images which are specified in advance.

Enter the ROI settings interface:

Configuration > Video/Audio > ROI




Figure 3-20 Region of Interest (2)

Stream Type:

You can set the ROI function for main stream, sub-stream and third stream. Select a stream type and then configure the ROI settings.

• **Fixed Region:** The fixed region encoding is the ROI encoding for the manually configured area. And you can choose the Image Quality Enhancing level for ROI encoding, and you can also name the ROI area.

Steps:

- 1. Select a Region No..
- 2. Check the **Enable** checkbox under **Fixed Region**.
- 3. Select the region from the dropdown list for ROI settings. There are four fixed regions selectable.

- 4. Click Draw Area, and then drag the mouse to draw the region of interest on the live video.
- 5. Adjust the **ROI level** from 1 to 6. The higher the value, the better image quality in the red frame.
- 6. Enter a **Region Name** and click **Save** to save the settings.
- **Dynamic Region:** The device can automatically calculate the region with motion. Set the Image Quality Enhancing level for ROI encoding.

Steps:

- 1. Check **Enable Face Tracking** and set ROI Level. Higher level means more resource is assigned to the face.
- 2. Check **Enable Target Tracking** and set ROI Level. Higher level means more resource is assigned to the target.
- 3. Click **Save** to save the settings.

Chapter 4 PTZ Control

4.1 Operating PTZ Control

Purpose:

In the live view interface, you can use the PTZ control buttons to control panning, tilting and zooming. Refer to *Section 3.2.2 Live View Operation* for detailed information.

4.1.1 Setting/Calling a Preset

Purpose:

A preset is a predefined image position. For the defined preset, you can click the calling button to quickly view the desired image position.

Setting a Preset:

Steps:

1. In the PTZ control panel, select a preset number from the preset list.



Figure 4-1 Setting a Preset

- 2. Use the PTZ control buttons to move the lens to the desired position.
 - Pan the camera to the right or left.
 - Tilt the camera up or down.
 - Zoom in or out.
 - Refocus the lens.
- 3. Click to finish the setting of the current preset.
- 4. Edit a preset name by double clicking on the default name such as preset 1. (The pre-defined presets are named already and not configurable. Refer to the user manual for detailed function description.)
- 5. You can click * to delete the preset.

Note:

You can configure up to 300 presets.

Calling a Preset:

In the PTZ control panel, select a defined preset from the list and click (to call the preset.




Figure 4-2 Calling a Preset

For convenient preset selection, refer to the following steps to navigate to the preset you want.

Steps:

- 1. Select any preset from the list.
- 2. Click the preset number you need on the keyboard.

Note:

The following presets are predefined with special commands. You can only call them but not configure them. For instance, preset 99 is the "Start auto scan". If you call the preset 99, the camera starts auto scan function.




Figure 4-3 Special Preset

Note:

You may need to use the OSD (On Screen Display) menu when controlling the camera remotely. To display the OSD menu on the live view screen, you can call the preset number 95.

4.1.2 Setting/Calling a Patrol

Purpose:

A patrol is a memorized series of preset function. It can be configured and called on the patrol settings interface. There are up to 8 patrols for customizing. A patrol can be configured with 32 presets.

Before you start:

Make sure that the presets you want to add into a patrol have been defined.

Setting a Patrol:

Steps:

- 1. In the PTZ control panel, click to enter the patrol settings interface.
- 2. Select a patrol number from the list and click .
- 3. Click + to enter the adding interface of preset, as shown in Figure 4-4.

4. Configure the preset number, patrol time and patrol speed.

Table 4-2 Patrol Time and Patrol Speed

- 5. Click **OK** to save a preset into the patrol.
- 6. Repeat the steps from 3 to 5 to add more presets.
- 7. Click **OK** to save all the patrol settings.
- Calling a Patrol:

In the PTZ control panel, select a defined patrol from the list and click to call the patrol, as shown in Figure 4-5.

4.1.3 Setting/Calling a Pattern

Purpose:

A pattern is a memorized series of pan, tilt, zoom, and preset functions. It can be called on the pattern settings interface. There are up to 4 patterns for customizing.

Setting a Pattern:

Steps:

- 1. In the PTZ control panel, click to enter the pattern settings interface.




Figure 4-6 Patterns Settings Interface

- 2. Select a pattern number from the list as shown in Figure 4-6.

- 3. Click to enable recording the panning, tilting and zooming actions.
- 4. Use the PTZ control buttons to move the lens to the desired position after the information of **Program Pattern Remaining Memory (%)** is displayed on the screen.
 - Pan the camera to the right or left.
 - Tilt the camera up or down.
 - Zoom in or out.
 - Refocus the lens.
- 5. Click to save all the pattern settings.

Notes:

- These 4 patterns can be operated separately and with no priority level.
- When configuring and calling the pattern, proportional pan is valid; the limit stops and auto flip will be invalid; and the 3D positioning operation is not supported.

4.2 PTZ Configuration

4.2.1 Configuring Basic PTZ Parameters

Purpose:

You can configure the basic PTZ parameters, including proportional pan, preset freezing, preset speed, etc.

1. Enter the Basic PTZ parameter configuration interface:

Configuration > PTZ > Basic Settings




Figure 4-7 Basic PTZ Configuration Interface

- 2. Configure the following settings:
- Basic Parameters: Enable/disable proportional pan and preset freezing, set the preset speed, manual control speed, keyboard control speed, auto scan speed, and zooming speed.
 - Proportional Pan: If you enable this function, the pan/tilt speeds change according to the
 amount of zoom. When there is a large amount of zoom, the pan/tilt speed will be slower for
 keeping the image from moving too fast on the live view image.
 - Preset Freezing: This function enables the live view to switch directly from one scene defined by a preset to another, without showing the middle areas between these two, to ensure the surveillance efficiency. It can also reduce the use of bandwidth in a digital network system.
 Note:

Preset freezing function is invalid when you calling a pattern.

- Preset Speed: You can set the speed of a defined preset from 1 to 8.
- Manual Control Speed: The manual control speed can be set as Compatible, Pedestrian, Non-motor Vehicle, Motor Vehicle or Auto.
 - Compatible: The control speed is same as the Keyboard Control Speed.
 - Pedestrian: Choose the **Pedestrian** when you monitor the pedestrians.

- Non-motor Vehicle: Choose the Non-motor Vehicle when you monitor the non-motor vehicles.
- Motor Vehicle: Choose the **Motor Vehicle** when you monitor the motor vehicles.
- Auto: You are recommended to set it to be auto when the application scene of the camera is complicated.
- Keyboard Control Speed: Define the speed of PTZ control by a keyboard as Low, Medium or High.
- Auto Scan Speed: The scan speed can be set from level 1 to 40.
- Max. Tilt-angle: Set the tilt-angle of the speed dome from the drop-down list.
- **Zooming Speed**: The zoom speed is adjustable from level 1 to 3.
- ◆ **PTZ OSD:** Set the on-screen display duration of the PTZ status.
 - Zoom Status: Set the OSD duration of zooming status as 2 seconds, 5 seconds, 10 seconds, Always Close or Always Open.
 - **PT Status:** Set the azimuth angle display duration while panning and tilting as 2 seconds, 5 seconds, 10 seconds, Always Close or Always Open.
 - Preset Status: Set the preset name display duration while calling the preset as 2 seconds, 5 seconds, 10 seconds, Always Close or Always Open.
- ◆ **Power-off Memory:** The camera can resume its previous PTZ status or actions after it restarted from a power-off. You can set the time point of which the camera resumes its PTZ status. You can set it to resume the status of 30 seconds, 60 seconds, 300 seconds or 600 seconds before power-off.
- 3. Click to save the settings.

4.2.2 Configuring PTZ Limits

Purpose:

The camera can be programmed to move within the configurable PTZ limits (left/right, up/down). **Steps:**

1. Enter the Limit configuration interface:

Configuration > PTZ > Limit




Figure 4-8 Configure the PTZ Limit

2. Click the **Enable Limit** checkbox and choose the limit type as manual stops or scan stops.

Manual Stops:

When manual limit stops are set, you can operate the PTZ control panel manually only in the limited surveillance area.

Scan Stops:

When scan limit stops are set, the random scan, frame scan, auto scan, tilt scan, panorama scan is performed only in the limited surveillance area.

Note:

Manual Stops of **Limit Type** is prior to **Scan Stops.** When you set these two limit types at the same time, **Manual Stops** is valid and **Scan Stops** is invalid.

- 3. Click the PTZ control buttons to find the left/right/up/down limit stops; you can also call the defined presets and set them as the limits of the camera.
- 4. Click **Set** to save the limits or click **Clear** to clear the limits.

4.2.3 Configuring Initial Position

Purpose:

The initial position is the origin of PTZ coordinates. It can be the factory default initial position. You can also customize the initial position according to your own demand.

♦ Customize an Initial Position:

Steps:

1. Enter the Initial Position configuration interface:

Configuration > PTZ > Initial Position

- 2. Click the PTZ control buttons to find a position as the initial position of the camera; you can also call a defined preset and set it as the initial position of the camera.
- 3. Click **Set** to save the position.
- **♦** Call/delete an Initial Position:

You can click to call the initial position. You can click to delete the initial position and restore the factory default initial position.

4.2.4 Configuring Park Action

Purpose:

This feature allows the camera to start a predefined park action (scan, preset, pattern and etc.) automatically after a period of inactivity (park time). The park action function only takes effect in Camera 1.

Note:

Scheduled Tasks function is prior to **Park Action** function. When these two functions are set at the same time, only the **Scheduled Tasks** function takes effect.

Steps:

1. Enter the Park Action settings interface:

Configuration > PTZ > Park Action

- 2. Check the **Enable Park Action** checkbox.
- 3. Set the **Park Time** as the inactivity time of the camera before it starts the park actions.
- 4. Choose Action Type from the dropdown list.




Figure 4-11 Action Types

5. Click to save the settings.

4.2.5 Configuring Privacy Mask

Purpose:

Privacy mask enables you to cover certain areas on the live video to prevent certain spots in the surveillance area from being live viewed and recorded. The privacy mask function only takes effect in Camera 1.

Steps:

1. Enter the Privacy Mask settings interface:

Configuration > PTZ > Privacy Mask




Figure 4-12 Draw the Privacy Mask

- 2. Click the PTZ control buttons to find the area you want to set the privacy mask.
- 3. Click Draw Area; drag the mouse in the live video window to draw the area.

 You can drag the corners of the red rectangle area to draw a polygon mask.
- 4. Click Stop Drawing to finish drawing or click to clear all of the areas you set without saving them.

5. Click Add to save the privacy mask, and it will be listed in the **Privacy Mask List** area; set the value of **Active Zoom Ratio** on your demand, and then the mask will only appear when the zoom ratio is greater than the predefined value.

6. you can also define the color of the masks.

- 7. You can select a mask and click Delete to delete it from the list.
- 8. Check the **Enable Privacy Mask** checkbox to enable this function.

Note:

You are allowed to draw up to 24 areas on the same image.

4.2.6 Configuring Scheduled Tasks

Purpose:

You can configure the network camera to perform a certain action automatically in a user-defined time period.

Steps:

1. Enter the Scheduled Task settings interface:

Configuration> PTZ > Scheduled Tasks




Figure 4-15 Configure Scheduled Tasks

- 2. Check the Enable Scheduled Task checkbox.
- 3. Set the **Park Time**. You can set the park time (a period of inactivity) before the camera starts the scheduled tasks.
- 4. Select the task type from the dropdown list. You can choose scan, preset, pattern and etc.

- 5. Select the timeline of a certain day, and drag the left button of the mouse to set the recording schedule (the start time and end time of the recording task).

Note:

The time of each task cannot be overlapped. Up to 10 tasks can be configured for each day.

8. Click to save the settings.

4.2.7 Clearing PTZ Configurations

Purpose:

You can clear PTZ configurations in this interface, including all presets, patrols, patterns, privacy masks, PTZ limits, scheduled tasks and park actions.

Steps:

- Enter the Clearing Configuration interface:
 Configuration > PTZ > Clear Config
- 2. Check the checkbox of the items you want to clear.
- 3. Click to clear the settings.

4.2.8 Configuring PTZ Control Priority

Steps:

1. Get to the configuration interface:

Configuration > PTZ > Prioritize PTZ.

- The camera can be controlled by network and RS-485 signals. You can set the control priority of these two signals.
- The operation of Operator is prior to that of User. When the Operator is controlling the camera, the User cannot control it. When the Operator finishes, the User can control the camera after the Delay time. The Delay time can be set in Priority PTZ interface as shown follows.

2. Click to activate the settings.

4.2.9 Configuring Panorama Tracking

Purpose:

After you enable this function, when the camera detects the moving object in the panoramic view, the Camera 02 will track the detected target. Camera 02 automatically adjusts its PTZ position to ensure that the target is in the center of PTZ view with certain detailed information. When you need to perform the manual tracking, click the icon of live view interface and click the target to start tracking. *Steps:*

Enter the Panorama Tracking settings interface:
 Configuration > PTZ > Panorama Tracking




Figure 4-20 Configure Smart Tracking

- 2. Check the **Enable Tracking** checkbox to enable panorama tracking function.
- 3. Select the calibration mode and perform the calibration.

Auto Calibration:

- (1) Select the calibration mode as Auto.
- (2) Move and zoom in/out the PTZ view to make sure the PTZ view and the panoramic view is almost the same.
- (3) Click **Calibrate** to start the auto calibration. After calibration for one scene is done, manually change to another scene to perform auto calibration.
- (4) After calibration for all scenes are done, click Auto Calibration Succeeded. The device reboots automatically to take effect.

Manual Calibration:

- (1) Select the calibration mode as Manual.
- (2) Move the No.1 site of panoramic view to certain site "\big|" and set the calibration site.
- (3) Move and zoom in/out the Camera 02 to make sure the + of PTZ view and the + of panoramic view are at the same position.
- (4) Click 🖶 to save the current site position information.
- (5) Select other sites, and repeat the steps above to save the site position information.
- (6) Click \rightarrow to switch the scene and set other calibration sites for the **Scene 2**.
- (7) The calibration is completed when note shows up as: Calibration Succeeded.

- 4. Set the tracking duration. The camera stops tracking when the duration time is up. The duration ranges from 0 to 60 seconds.
- 5. Click Set Zoom Ratio to set the current zoom ratio as the tracking zoom ratio.
- 6. You can select **Add**, **Delete**, and **Clear All** to edit the calibration sites. The coordinates and PTZ positions of selected calibration sites will appear in the list below. In auto calibration mode, click

Calibration to refresh the PTZ position; and in manual calibration mode, click to refresh the PTZ position.




Figure 4-21 Calibration Parameters

Notes:

- In auto calibration mode, the more similar is the PTZ view and the panoramic view, the panorama tracking gets more accurate.
- The more distant manual calibration sites are to each other, the panorama tracking gets more accurate.

4.2.10 Rapid Focus

Purpose:

After this function is enabled, perform calibration and the focus can be quicker than quick focus.

Steps:

- 1. Enter the Position Settings interface:
 - Configuration > PTZ > Position Settings.
- 2. Check the Enable checkbox to enable the Rapid Focus.
- 3. Drag the red line on the live view image to the calibration position according to the user. You can drag the ends of the red line to adjust the length of the line.
- 4. Click Start Calibration. There is the notice Calibrating on the live view image and the camera lens performs auto focus.
- 5. After calibration, there is the notice Calibration succeeded on the live view image.
- 6. Click Save to save the settings.
- 7. You can repeat step 3 to step 6 to configure rapid focus for multiple scenes. Up to four scenes are supported.

Chapter 5 Storage and Playback

Notes:

- In this and the following chapters, operation of the camera by the web browser will be taken as an example.
- You can set recording and capture schedule for different channels of the camera. Refer to the actual configuration interface.

5.1 Storage Settings

Before you start:

To configure record settings, make sure that you have the network storage device within the network or the memory card has been inserted in the corresponding card slot. Refer to the quick start guide for the location of the memory card slot.

5.1.1 Configuring Net HDD

Before you start:

The network disk should be available within the network and properly configured to store the recorded files, log files, etc.

Steps:

Add Net HDD

1. Enter the NAS (Network-Attached Storage) settings interface:

Configuration > Storage > Storage Management > Net HDD

- 2. Input the IP address of the network disk, and input the file path.
- 3. Select the mounting type. NFS and SMB/CIFS are selectable. You can set the user name and password to guarantee the security if SMB/CIFS is selected.

Note:

Refer to the NAS User Manual for creating the file path.



For your privacy and to better protect your system against security risks, we strongly recommend
the use of strong passwords for all functions and network devices. The password should be
something of your own choosing (Using a minimum of 8 characters, including at least three of

the following categories: upper case letters, lower case letters, numbers, and special characters.) in order to increase the security of your product.

- Proper configuration of all passwords and other security settings is the responsibility of the installer and/or end-user.
- 4. If the status of the disk is *Uninitialized*, check the corresponding checkbox to select the disk and click **Format** to start initializing the disk.
- 5. Click to save the settings.

5.1.2 HDD Management

If the memory card is inserted in the device or NAS (Network-Attached Storage) is added, enter HDD Management interface to configure the storage status.

Steps:

1. Enter the HDD settings interface

Configuration > Storage > Storage Management > HDD Management,

You can view the capacity, free space, status, type and property of the disk.




Figure 5-2 Storage Management Interface

- 2. If the status of the disk is **Uninitialized**, check the corresponding checkbox to select the disk and click **Format** to start initializing the disk.
- 3. When the initialization completed, the status of disk will become Normal.




Figure 5-3 View Disk Status

Define the Quota for Record and Pictures

Steps:

- 1. Input the quota percentage for picture and for record.
- 2. Click **Save** and refresh the browser page to activate the settings.




Figure 5-4 Quota Settings

Note:

Up to 8 NAS disks can be connected to the camera.

5.1.3 Configuring Record Schedule

Before you start:

Make sure a local memory card is inserted in the camera or the network storage is added to the camera.

Purpose:

There are two kinds of recording for the cameras: manual recording and scheduled recording. In this section, you can follow the instructions to configure the scheduled recording. By default, the record files of scheduled recording are stored in the memory card (if supported) or in the network disk.

Steps:

1. Enter the Record Schedule settings interface:

Configuration > Storage > Schedule Settings > Record Schedule




Figure 5-5 Record Schedule Interface

- 2. Check the **Enable** checkbox to enable scheduled recording.
- 3. To set the advanced settings of the camera, click Advanced to enter the advanced settings interface.




Figure 5-6 Record Parameters

• **Pre-record:** The time you set to start recording before the scheduled time or the event. For example, if an alarm triggers recording at 10:00, and the pre-record time is set as 5 seconds, the camera starts to record at 9:59:55.

The Pre-record time can be configured as No Pre-record, 5 s, 10 s, 15 s, 20 s, 25 s, 30 s or not limited.

Note:

The pre-record time changes according to the video bitrate.

Post-record: The time you set to stop recording after the scheduled time or the event. For
example, if an alarm triggered recording ends at 11:00, and the post-record time is set as 5
seconds, the camera records until 11:00:05.

The Post-record time can be configured as 5 s, 10 s, 30 s, 1 min, 2 min, 5 min or 10 min.

Note:

The Pre-record and Post-record parameters vary depending on different camera models.

- **Stream Type**: You can select the stream type for recording; Main stream, sub stream and third stream are selectable. If you select the sub stream, you can record for a longer time with the same storage capacity.
- **Overwrite**: If you enable this function and the HDD is full, the new record files overwrite the oldest record files automatically.
- 4. Click **OK** to save the advanced setting.

- 5. Set the record schedule:
 - (1) Select a **Record Type**. The record type can be Continuous, Motion, Alarm, Motion | Alarm, Motion & Alarm, and Event.
 - Continuous

If you select **Continuous**, the video will be recorded automatically according to the time of the schedule.

Record Triggered by Motion Detection

If you select **Motion**, the video will be recorded when the motion is detected. Besides configuring the recording schedule, you have to set the motion detection area and check the **Trigger Channel** checkbox in the **Linkage Method** of Motion Detection settings interface. For detailed information, refer to the *Step 1 in the Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection*.

Record Triggered by Alarm

If you select **Alarm**, the video will be recorded when the alarm is triggered via the external alarm input channels.

Besides configuring the recording schedule, you have to set the **Alarm Type** and check the **Trigger Channel** checkbox in the **Linkage Method** of **Alarm Input Settings** interface. For detailed information, refer to **Section 6.1.3 Configuring Alarm Input**.

Record Triggered by Motion | Alarm

If you select **Motion | Alarm**, the video will be recorded when the external alarm is triggered or the motion is detected.

Besides configuring the recording schedule, you have to configure the settings on the **Motion Detection** and **Alarm Input** settings interfaces. Refer to **Section 6.1.1** and **Section 6.1.3** for detailed information.

Record Triggered by Motion & Alarm

If you select **Motion & Alarm**, the video will be recorded when the motion and alarm are triggered at the same time.

Besides configuring the recording schedule, you have to configure the settings on the **Motion Detection** and **Alarm Input** settings interfaces. Refer to **Section 6.1.1** and **Section 6.1.3** for detailed information.

- Record Triggered by Audio Exception Detection: If you select Audio Exception Detection, the
 video will be recorded when the audio exception detection is triggered. Besides configuring
 the recording schedule, you have to configure the Audio Exception Detection.
- Record Triggered by VCA events: If you select VCA, the video will be recorded when the either
 of the VCA events is triggered. Besides configuring the recording schedule, you have to
 configure the VCA.
- Record Triggered by smart events: The smart evets include Line Crossing Detection, Intrusion
 Detection, Region Entrance Detection and Region Exiting Detection. If you select to record by
 one type of the smart events, the video will be recorded when the selected smart event is
 triggered. Besides configuring the recording schedule, you have to configure the specific event
 settings.
- Record Triggered by All Events: If you select Event, the video will be recorded when any event
 is detected.

Note:

Either the smart events or the VCA events are supported, which varies depending on the camera models.

- 6. Select the record type, and drag the mouse on the time bar to set the record schedule.
- 7. Click to save the settings.

5.1.4 Configuring Capture Schedule

Purpose:

You can configure the scheduled snapshot and event-triggered snapshot. The captured picture can be stored in the local storage or network storage.

Steps:

1. Enter the Capture settings interface:

Configuration > Storage > Storage Settings > Capture

- 2. Click Capture Schedule to enter the Capture interface.
- 3. Select the timeline of a certain day, and drag the left button of the mouse to set the capture schedule (the start time and end time of the recording task).
- 4. After you set the scheduled task, you can click 📋 and copy the task to other days (optional).
- After setting the capture schedule, you can click a capture segment to display the segment capture settings interface to edit the segment capture parameters. (optional)

- 6. Click Capture Parameters to enter the Capture Parameters interface.
- 7. Check the **Enable Timing Snapshot** checkbox to enable continuous snapshot, and configure the schedule of timing snapshot. Check the **Enable Event-triggered Snapshot** checkbox to enable event-triggered snapshot.
- 8. Select the format, resolution, quality of the snapshot.
- 9. Set the time interval between two snapshots.

10. Click



to save the settings.

5.1.5 Cloud Storage

Purpose:

The captured pictures can be saved on an NVR which works in the Cloud Storage mode.

Note:

Cloud storage function varies according to different camera models.

Before you start:

Make sure the NVR has been switched into the Cloud Storage working mode, refer to the User Manual of NVR for details.

Steps:

- 1. Check the checkbox of Enable Cloud Storage.
- 2. Input the IP address and port of the storage server.
- 3. Input the user name, password and confirm password for the authentication of the storage server.
- 4. Input picture storage pool ID on the server.
- 5. (Optional) You can click Test to test the cloud storage settings.
- 6. Click Save to save the settings.

Note:

The storage server port ranges from 2000 to 65535 and the picture storage pool ID ranges from 1 to 255.

5.2 Picture

Purpose:

This section explains how to view the captured picture files stored in the network disks and download the captured pictures.

Steps:

1. Click Picture on the menu bar to enter picture interface.




Figure 5-10 Picture Interface

2. Select the search conditions, including the picture type, start time, and end time, then click **Search**. The results will be listed on the picture list area.

- 3. Select one picture and click **Preview** to preview the picture.
- 4. Check the checkbox in front of the files that you need to download.
- 5. Click Download to download the files.

Note:

Configure the saving path from Configuration > Local Configuration > Save snapshots in live view.

5.3 Playback

Purpose:

This section explains how to view the remotely recorded video files stored in the memory card or network disks.

5.3.1 Play Back Video Files

Steps:

1. Click Playback on the menu bar to enter playback interface.




Figure 5-11 Playback Interface






Figure 5-14 Set Playback Time




Figure 5-16 Video Types




Figure 5-17 Video Downloading interface

Steps:

1. Click download interface pops up.

- 2. Set the linkage type of capturing the pictures as timing, alarm, motion, etc..
- 3. Set the start time and end time. Click **Search** and the corresponding picture files will be listed on the left.
- 4. Check the checkbox in front of the files that you need to download.
- 5. Click **Download** to download the files.

Chapter 6 Events Settings

Purpose:

This section explains how to configure the camera to respond to alarm events, including motion detection, video tampering, video loss, alarm input, alarm output, exception, and audio exception detection. These events can trigger the alarm actions, such as Send Email, Notify Surveillance Center, Upload to FTP/Memory Card/NAS, etc.

For example, when an external alarm is triggered, the camera sends a notification to an e-mail address.

6.1 Basic Event Configuration

6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection

Purpose:

Motion detection is a feature which can trigger alarm actions and actions of recording videos when the motion occurred in the surveillance scene.

Steps:

- 1. Enter the motion detection setting interface:
 - Configuration > Event > Basic Event > Motion Detection
- 2. Select the camera **Channel No.** from the dropdown list.

Note:

The Camera 1 is the PTZ channel, and the Camera 2 and Camera 3 are the panoramic view channels.

- 3. Check the **Enable Motion Detection** checkbox to enable this function.
 - You can check the **Enable Dynamic Analysis for Motion** checkbox if you want the detected object get marked with rectangle in the live view.
- 4. Select the configuration mode as *Normal* or *Expert* and set the corresponding motion detection parameters.

Normal

Steps:

- (1) Click Draw Area. Drag the mouse on the live video image to draw a motion detection area.
- (2) Click Stop Drawing to finish drawing.

Notes:

- You can draw up to 8 motion detection areas on the same image.
- You can click Clear All to clear all of the areas.
- (3) Move the slider Sensitivity of the detection.




Figure 6-1 Motion Detection Settings-Normal

Expert




Figure 6-2 Motion Detection Settings-Expert

Steps:

(1) Set the **Scheduled Image Settings**, there are OFF, Auto-Switch and Scheduled-Switch selectable. If the switch mode is enabled, you can configure the detection rule for the day and night separately.

OFF: Disable the day and night switch.

Auto-Switch: Switch the day and night mode according to the illumination automatically.

Scheduled-Switch: Switch to the day mode at 6:00 a.m., and switch to the night mode at 18:00 p.m.

- (2) Select **Area** to configure in the dropdown list.
- (3) Set the values of Sensitivity.

Sensitivity: The greater the value is, the easier the alarm will be triggered.

- 5. Set the Arming Schedule for Motion Detection.
 - (1) Click Arming Schedule tab to enter the arming schedule setting interface.




Figure 6-3 Arming Schedule

- (2) Select the timeline of a certain day, and drag the mouse to set the arming schedule (the start time and end time of the arming task).
- (3) After you set the scheduled task, you can click 📋 and copy the task to other days (optional).

Note:

The time of each period cannot be overlapped. Up to 8 periods can be configured for each day.

Set the Alarm Actions for Motion Detection.

Click Linkage Method tab to enter the Linkage Method interface.

You can specify the linkage method when an event occurs. The following contents are about how to configure the different types of linkage method.




Figure 6-6 Linkage Method

Check the checkbox to select the linkage method. Send Email, Notify Surveillance Center, Upload to FTP/Memory Card/NAS, Trigger Alarm Output and Trigger Recording are selectable.

Send Email

Send an email with alarm information to a user or users when an event occurs.

Note:

- To send the Email when an event occurs, you need to refer to Section 2.2.2 Advanced Settings
 Configuring Email Settings to set the Email parameters.
- Notify Surveillance Center

Send an exception or alarm signal to remote management software when an event occurs.

Upload to FTP/Memory Card/NAS

Capture the image when an alarm is triggered and upload the picture to a FTP server.

Note:

You need a FTP server and set FTP parameters first. Refer to **Section 2.2.2 Advanced Settings - Configuring FTP Settings** for setting FTP parameters.

Trigger Recording

Record a video when an event occurs.

Note:

You have to set the recording schedule to realize this function. Refer to **Section 5.1 Storage Settings** for settings the recording schedule.

Trigger Alarm Output

Trigger one or more external alarm outputs when an event occurs.

Note:

To trigger an alarm output when an event occurs, refer to **Section 6.1.4 Configuring Alarm Output** to set the alarm output parameters.

6.1.2 Configuring Video Tampering Alarm

Purpose:

You can configure the camera to trigger the alarm actions when the lens is covered.

Steps:

1. Enter the video tampering settings interface:

Configuration > Event > Basic Event > Video Tampering

- 2. Check the **Enable** checkbox to enable the tampering detection.
- 3. Set the tampering area. Refer to *Step 4* in *Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection*.
- 4. Click Arming Schedule tab to enter the arming schedule setting interface. The arming schedule configuration is the same as the setting of the arming schedule for motion detection. Refer to Step 5 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.

- 5. Click Linkage Method tab to select the linkage method taken for the video loss alarm. Send Email,
 Notify Surveillance Center, and Trigger Alarm Output are selectable. Refer to Step 6 in Section 6.1.1
 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 6. Click to save the settings.

6.1.3 Configuring Alarm Input

Steps:

- Enter the Alarm Input settings interface:
 Configuration > Event > Basic Event > Alarm Input
- Choose the Alarm Input No. and the Alarm Type. The alarm type can be NO (Normally Open) and NC (Normally Closed).
- 3. Edit the name in Alarm Name (cannot copy) to set a name for the alarm input (optional).




Figure 6-8 Alarm Input Settings

- 4. Click Arming Schedule tab to enter the arming schedule setting interface. The arming schedule configuration is the same as the setting of the arming schedule for motion detection. Refer to Step 5 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 5. Click Linkage Method tab to select the linkage method taken for the video loss alarm. Send Email, Notify Surveillance Center, Upload to FTP/Memory Card/NAS, Trigger Alarm Output and Trigger Recording are selectable. Refer to Step 6 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 6. You can also choose the PTZ linking for the alarm input. Check the relative checkbox and select the No. to enable Preset Calling, Patrol Calling or Pattern Calling.




Figure 6-9 Linkage Method

6.1.4 Configuring Alarm Output

Steps:

- Enter the Alarm Output settings interface:
 Configuration> Event > Basic Event > Alarm Output
- 2. Select one alarm output channel in the Alarm Output dropdown list.
- 3. Set a name in Alarm Name (cannot copy) for the alarm output (optional).

- 5. Click Arming Schedule tab to enter the arming schedule setting interface. The time schedule configuration is the same as the settings of the arming schedule for motion detection. Refer to Step 5 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.




Figure 6-10 Alarm Output Settings

6.1.5 Handling Exception

The exception type can be HDD full, HDD error, network disconnected, IP address conflicted and illegal login to the cameras.

Steps:

- 1. Enter the Exception settings interface:
 - Configuration > Event > Basic Event > Exception
- 2. Check the checkbox to set the actions taken for the Exception alarm. Refer to *Step 6* in *Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection*.




Figure 6-11 Exception Settings

6.2 Smart Event Configuration

6.2.1 Detecting Audio Exception

Purpose:

When you enable this function and audio exception occurs, the alarm actions will be triggered.

Steps:

1. Enter the audio exception detection interface:

Configuration > Event > Smart Event > Audio Exception Detection




Figure 6-12 Audio Exception Detection

- 2. Check the Audio Loss Detection checkbox to enable the audio input exception detection.
- Check the Sudden Increase of Sound Intensity Detection checkbox to enable the sudden rise detection.
 - **Sensitivity**: Range [1-100], the smaller the value the more severe the sound change will trigger the detection.
 - **Sound Intensity Threshold**: Range [1-100], it can filter the sound in the environment, the louder the environment sound, the higher the value should be. You can adjust it according to the actual environment.
- 4. Check the **Sudden Decrease of Sound Intensity Detection** checkbox to enable the sudden drop detection.
 - **Sensitivity**: Range [1-100], the smaller the value the more severe the sound change will trigger the detection.
- 5. Click Arming Schedule tab to enter the arming schedule setting interface. The time schedule configuration is the same as the settings of the arming schedule for motion detection. Refer to Step 5 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 6. Click Linkage Method tab to select the linkage method taken for the video loss alarm. Send Email, Notify Surveillance Center, Trigger Alarm Output, and Trigger Recording are selectable. Refer to Step 3 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 7. Click to save the settings.

6.2.2 Configuring Intrusion Detection

Intrusion detection can set an area in the surveillance scene and once the area is entered, a set of alarm action is triggered.

Steps:

1. Enter the intrusion detection interface:

Configuration > Events > Smart Event > Intrusion Detection

2. Check the **Enable** checkbox.




Figure 6-13 Configuring Intrusion Area

- 3. The event triggered and park action related PTZ movement will be locked for 180 seconds after you enter the intrusion detection interface. Optionally, you can click the Unlock(69s) button to manually activate the movement, or lock the movement when the button turns to by clicking it.
- 4. Draw area.
 - (1) Select the Region No.in dropdown list.
 - (2) Click Draw Area to draw a rectangle on the image as a defense region.
 - (3) Click on the image to specify a corner of the rectangle, and right-click the mouse after four corners are configured.
- 5. Configure the parameters for each defense region separately.
 - Region: In this column, you can select a region.
 - Threshold: Range [0-10s], the threshold for the time of the object loitering in the region. If you set the value as 0, alarm is triggered immediately after the object entering the region.
 - **Sensitivity:** Range [1-100]. The value of the sensitivity defines the size of the object which can trigger the alarm, when the sensitivity is high, a very small object can trigger the alarm.
- 6. Click Arming Schedule tab to enter the arming schedule setting interface. The time schedule configuration is the same as the settings of the arming schedule for motion detection. Refer to Step 5 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.

- 7. Click Linkage Method tab to select the linkage method taken for intrusion detection, Notify Surveillance Center, Send Email, Upload to FTP/Memory Card/NAS, Trigger Alarm Output and Trigger Recording are selectable. Refer to Step 3 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 8. Click to save the settings.

6.2.3 Configuring Line Crossing Detection

The virtual plane detection can be adopted for the intrusion detection. Once the virtual plane is detected being traversed according to the configured direction, a set of alarm action is triggered. **Steps:**

- Enter the Line Crossing Detection interface:
 Configuration > Event > Smart Event > Line Crossing Detection
- 2. Check the **Enable** checkbox to enable the line crossing detection function.
- 3. Select the Line in dropdown list to configure.
- 4. The event triggered and park action related PTZ movement will be locked for 180 seconds after you enter the line crossing detection interface. Optionally, you can click the Unlock(69s) button to manually activate the movement, or lock the movement when the button turns to by clicking it.




Figure 6-14 Configuring Line

- (1) Click Draw Area to draw a line on the image.
- (2) Click the line to switch to the editing mode.

 Drag an end to the desired place to adjust the length and angle of the line. And drag the line to adjust the location.
- 6. Configure the parameters for each defense region separately.
 - Direction: Select the detection direction in the dropdown list, there are A<->B, A->B and B->A selectable.
 - **Sensitivity:** Range [1-100]. The value of the sensitivity defines the size of the object which can trigger the alarm, when the sensitivity is high, a very small object can trigger the alarm.
- 7. Click Arming Schedule tab to enter the arming schedule setting interface. The time schedule configuration is the same as the settings of the arming schedule for motion detection. Refer to Step 5 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 8. Click Linkage Method tab to select the linkage method taken for the line crossing detection, Notify Surveillance Center, Send Email, Upload to FTP/Memory Card/NAS, Trigger Alarm Output and Trigger Recording are selectable. Refer to Step 3 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 9. Click to save the settings.

6.2.4 Configuring Region Entrance Detection

Purpose:

Region entrance detection function detects people, vehicle or other objects which enter a pre-defined virtual region from the outside place, and some certain actions can be taken when the alarm is triggered.

Steps:

- Enter the Region Entrance Detection settings interface:
 Configuration> Event > Smart Event> Region Entrance Detection
- 2. Check the checkbox of **Enable** to enable the Region Entrance Detection function.




Figure 6-15 Configuring Region Entrance Detection

- 3. Select the region from the dropdown list for detection settings.
- 4. Click the Draw Area button to start the region drawing.
- 5. Click on the live video to specify the four vertexes of the detection region, and right click to complete drawing.

- 6. **Sensitivity:** Range [1-100]. The value of the sensitivity defines the size of the object which can trigger the alarm, when the sensitivity is high, a very small object can trigger the alarm.
- 7. **Detection Target:** Set the detection target for the region entrance detection. You can select human, vehicle, or all (human &vehicle) as the detection target from the dropdown list. If Human is selected, only human beings will be identified as detection objects and as well as Vehicle.
- 8. Click Arming Schedule tab to enter the arming schedule setting interface. The time schedule configuration is the same as the settings of the arming schedule for motion detection. Refer to Step 5 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 9. Click Linkage Method tab to select the linkage method taken for the video loss alarm, Notify surveillance center, send email, upload to FTP, trigger channel, smart tracking and trigger alarm output are selectable. Refer to Step 3 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 10. Click to save the settings.

6.2.5 Configuring Region Exiting Detection

Purpose:

Region exiting detection function detects people, vehicle or other objects which exit from a pre-defined virtual region, and some certain actions can be taken when the alarm is triggered.

Steps:

- 1. Enter the Region Exiting Detection settings interface:
 - Configuration > Event > Smart Event > Region Exiting Detection
- 2. Check the checkbox of **Enable** to enable the Region Exiting Detection function.




Figure 6-16 Configuring Region Exiting Detection

- 3. Select the region from the dropdown list for detection settings.
- 4. Click the Draw Area button to start the region drawing.

- 6. **Sensitivity:** Range [1-100]. The value of the sensitivity defines the size of the object which can trigger the alarm, when the sensitivity is high, a very small object can trigger the alarm.
- 7. **Detection Target:** Set the detection target for the region entrance detection. You can select human, vehicle, or all (human &vehicle) as the detection target from the dropdown list. If Human is selected, only human beings will be identified as detection objects and as well as Vehicle.
- 8. Click Arming Schedule tab to enter the arming schedule setting interface. The time schedule configuration is the same as the settings of the arming schedule for motion detection. Refer to Step 5 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.
- 9. Click Linkage Method tab to select the linkage method taken for the video loss alarm, Notify surveillance center, send email, upload to FTP, trigger channel, smart tracking and trigger alarm output are selectable. Refer to Step 3 in Section 6.1.1 Configuring Motion Detection.

6.3 VCA Configuration

Purpose:

You can do intelligent analysis such as behavior analysis and face capture, etc. with the camera. Multiple rules can be configured for different requirements.

Note

VCA is only available for panoramic camera channel.

6.3.1 Configuring VCA Information (Overlay & Capture)

Steps:

1. Enter the VCA configuration interface:

Configuration > VCA > Overlay & Capture




Figure 6-17 Overlay & Capture

- 2. Set the display information:
 - Display VCA info. on Stream: The green frames will be displayed on the target if in a live view or playback.
 - Display Target info. on Alarm Picture: There will be a frame on the target on the uploaded alarm picture if the checkbox is checked.
 - Display Rule info. on Alarm Picture: The captured target and the configured area will be framed on the alarm picture.
- 3. Set the Snapshot:
 - You can check the checkbox to upload JPEG image to surveillance center when VCA alarm occurs.
 - You can also set the quality of the picture.
- 4. Click to save the settings.

6.3.2 Shield Region

Purpose:

Shield Region is the user-defined areas in surveillance scene that the analysis doesn't take effect. Usually, they can be privacy areas. Set if needed.

Steps:

- 1. Click Shield Region tab to enter the shield region configuration interface
- 2. Click **Draw Area**. Draw area by left click end-points in the live view window, and right click to finish the area drawing. Polygon area with up to 10 sides are supported.
- 3. Click **Save** to save the settings.

6.3.3 Rule Configuration Demonstration

This section provides detailed configuration steps for each rule.

- 1. Click Rule Tab to enter the rule configuration interface.
- 2. Check the checkbox in Rule List to enable the rule for behavior analysis.
- 3. For the selected rule, set the Rule Name, Rule Type, and complete rule-specified settings.

Line Crossing

Purpose:

This function can be used for detecting people, vehicles and objects traversing a set virtual plane. The traversing direction can be set as bidirectional, from left to right or from right to left. The alarm will be triggered if the rule is broken.

Steps:

- 1) Create new rule: Click + add a new rule.
- 2) Select rule type: Click the dropdown list and select **Line Crossing** as the rule type.




Figure 6-20 Select Crossing Direction




Figure 6-24 Draw Area




Figure 6-26 Draw Area

 Configuration > VCA > Advanced Configuration




Figure 6-27 Advanced Configuration

2. Adjust Parameters.

Scene Mode: Select a scene mode to activate certain scene-specific settings.

Detection Sensitivity: Range [0-4], the higher the sensitivity is, the easier the target will be detected.

Background Update Rate: Range [0-4], if a detected target remains in the monitoring scene for a certain time, the system will count the target as the background automatically. The greater the value is, the faster the target will be counted as the background.

Restore Default: Click **Restore** to restore the parameters to the default.

Restart VCA: Click Restart to restart the VCA function.

3. Global Size Filter

Global Size filter is valid for all panoramic channels. Targets larger or smaller than the set size range are filtered out.

Steps:

- 1) Enable Global Size Filter.
- 2) Click and draw a max size frame on live image.
- 3) Click and draw a min size frame on live image.
- 4) Click Save to save the settings.
- 4. Click to save the settings.

6.4 Face Capture

Face capture function detects and captures faces in surveillance scenes. When the grading of the detected face exceeds an algorithm-defined value, the PTZ camera channel captures the face and triggers linkage actions. Set up Capture Parameters and advanced parameters before using the function.

Note:

For certain camera models, you need to select **Face Capture** on **VCA Resource** (**Configuration** > **System** > **System Settings**) page first.

Steps:

- 1. Check **Enable** to enable the function.
- 2. Set up face capture rule.
 - 1) Select a **Detection Scene** from the dropdown list.
 - 2) Adjust the live image to a desired scene. you can use PTZ control panel or click scene with a face. Click **Lock** to lock PTZ for further settings.
 - 3) Click and draw detection area on live image.
 - 4) Click and draw min. pupil distance on live image.
 - 5) Input Mounting Height of the camera.
 - 6) Save the settings for the detection scene.
 - 7) Repeat the steps to set other detection scenes.
 - 8) Save the settings.
- 3. Set arming schedule and patrol schedule if needed.

Arming Schedule: In scheduled arming time, the camera is ready to capture detected faces in set detection scenes.

Patrol Schedule: The camera patrols the detection scenes following configured order and dwell time, and capture faces during its patrol.

- 1) Set arming schedule.
 - i. Click Patrol Schedule tab.
 - ii. Draw blue time bar. Up to 8 time segments are supported for each day.
- 2) Set patrol schedule.
 - i. Click the set blue time bar.
 - ii. Click **Configuration** in the pop-up bubble.
 - iii. Add detection scenes, adjust the patrol sequence and set dwell time for each detection scene.
 - iv. Save the settings by clicking **OK**.
- 3) (Optional) You can copy the settings of a day to other days by click on right end of the time bar.
- 4. Set linkage method.

Chapter 7 System Settings

7.1 Basic Information

7.1.1 Viewing Basic Information

Enter the **Basic Information** interface:

Configuration > System > System Settings > Basic Information

In the **Basic Information** interface, you can edit the Device Name and Device No.

Other information of the camera, such as Model, Serial No., Firmware Version, Encoding Version, Web Version, Plugin Version, Number of Channels, Number of HDDs, Number of Alarm Input and Number of Alarm Output are displayed. The information cannot be changed in this menu. It is the reference for maintenance or modification in future.




Figure 7-1 Device Information

7.1.2 Time Settings

Purpose:

You can follow the instructions in this section to configure the time which can be displayed on the video. There are Time Zone, Time Synchronization, Daylight Saving Time (DST) functions for setting the time. Time Synchronization consists of auto mode by Network Time Protocol (NTP) server and manual mode. To enter the Time settings interface:

Configuration > System > System Settings > Time Settings




Figure 7-2 Time Settings

Configuring Time Synchronization by NTP Server

Steps:

- (1) Check the radio button to enable the NTP function.
- (2) Configure the following settings:

Server Address: IP address of NTP server.

NTP Port: Port of NTP server.

Interval: The time interval between the two synchronizing actions by NTP server. It can be set from 1 to 10080 minutes.




Figure 7-3 Time Sync by NTP Server

(3) You can click Test to check whether the confguration is succeeded.

Note:

If the camera is connected to a public network, you should use a NTP server that has a time synchronization function, such as the server at the National Time Center (IP Address: 210.72.145.44). If the camera is set in a customized network, NTP software can be used to establish a NTP server for time synchronization.

Configuring Time Synchronization Manually

Steps:

- (1) Check the Manual Time Sync radio button.
- (2) Click to set the system time from the pop-up calendar.
- (3) Click to save the settings.

Note:

You can also check the **Sync. with computer time** checkbox to synchronize the time of the camera with the time of your computer.




Figure 7-4 Time Sync Manually

Select the Time Zone

Purpose:

When the camera is taken to another time zone, you can use the **Time Zone** function to adjust the time. The time will be adjusted according to the original time and the time difference between the two time zones.

From the **Time Zone** dropdown menu as shown in Figure 7-5, select the Time Zone in which the camera locates.

7.1.3 Configuring RS-485

Purpose:

The RS-485 serial port is used to control the PTZ of the camera. The configuring of the PTZ parameters should be done before you control the PTZ unit.




Figure 7-6 RS-485 Settings

Note:

The Baud rate, PTZ Protocol and PTZ Address parameters of the camera should be exactly the same as those of the control device.

7.1.4 Configuring DST (Daylight Saving Time)

Purpose:

If there is the habit of adjusting clocks forward in your country in certain time period of a year, you can turn this function on. The time will be adjusted automatically when the Daylight Saving Time (DST) comes.

Steps:

- 1. Enter the DST settings interface:
 - Configuration > System > System Settings > DST
- 2. Check Enable DST to enable the DST function.
- 3. Set the date of the DST period.
- 4. Click to save the settings.




Figure 7-7 DST Settings

7.1.5 VCA Resource

VCA resource offers users options to enable certain VCA function and disable others when several VCA functions are available. It helps allocate more resources to the wanted functions.

Steps:

- 3. Save the settings. A reboot is needed for the settings to take effect.




Figure 7-8 Restore Default Settings




Figure 7-11 Log Searching Interface

7.2.3 System Service

Hardware

It refers to the hardware service, for example supplement light, the camera supports. Check correspondent function to enable it. Supported functions varies according to the different cameras.

Note:

The supplement light configuration is only supported by certain models.

Software

You can set the maximum live view connection. Up to 18 users are supported for live view at the same time.

Note:

The number of live view connection varies according to different camera models. The maximum number of live view connection equals the number of camera channels multiplied by 6. If the camera supports 2 channels, up to 12 users are supported for live view at the same time.

Steps:

- 1. Enter the interface of configuring the remote connection:
 - Configuration > System > Maintenance > System Service
- 2. Input a number in text field as the upper limit of the remote connection number. E.g. when you specify the remote connection number as 10, then the 11th remote connection cannot be established.

7.3 Security

7.3.1 Configuring Authentication

Purpose:

You can specifically secure the stream data of live view. RTSP authentication and WEB authentication are supported.




Figure 7-13 IP Address Filter

As Administrator

The administrator can add, delete or modify user accounts, and grant them different permissions. We highly recommend administrator to manage the device accounts and user permissions properly. Up to 31 user accounts can be created.

Administrator need to input correct admin password when changing settings of other operators or users.

Administrator can set **Security Question**. Security question is used to reset the forgotten password. When resetting the forgotten password, the PC the administrator uses and the camera should belong to the same IP address segment of the same LAN.

As Operator or User

Operator or user can modify password. Old password is required for this action.

Password Recommendation

The system judges the password strength automatically when creating the password. A strong password is highly recommended to ensure your data security. And a strong password should be your own choosing (using a minimum of 8 characters, including at least three of the following categories: upper case letters, lower case letters, numbers, and special characters).

Online User

Enter the Online Users configuration interface:

Configuration > System > User Management > Online Users




Figure 7-16 Online User

You can see the current users who are visiting the device through this interface. User information, such as user name, level, IP address, and operation time, is displayed in the User List. Click **Refresh** to refresh the list.

Appendix 1 SADP Software Introduction

Description of SADP

SADP (Search Active Devices Protocol) is a kind of user-friendly and installation-free online device search tool. It searches the active online devices within your subnet and displays the information of the devices. You can also modify the basic network information of the devices using this software.

Search active devices online

Search online devices automatically

After launch the SADP software, it automatically searches the online devices every 15 seconds from the subnet where your computer locates. It displays the total number and information of the searched devices in the Online Devices interface. Device information including the device type, IP address and port number, etc. will be displayed.




Figure A.1.1 Searching Online Devices

Note:

Device can be searched and displayed in the list in 15 seconds after it went online; it will be removed from the list in 45 seconds after it went offline.

Search online devices manually

You can also click Refresh to refresh the online device list manually. The newly searched devices will be added to the list.

Note:

You can click or on each column heading to order the information; you can click to expand the device table and hide the network parameter panel on the right side, or click to show the network parameter panel.

Modify network parameters

Steps:

- 1. Select the device to be modified in the device list and the network parameters of the device will be displayed in the **Modify Network Parameters** panel on the right side.
- 2. Edit the modifiable network parameters, e.g. IP address and port number.
- 3. Enter the password of the admin account of the device in the **Password** field and click save the changes.




Figure A.1.2 Modify Network Parameters

Appendix 2 Statics, Interference Lightning and Surge Protection

This product adopts TVS plate lightning protection technology to avoid damage caused by pulse signal that is below 3000V, like instantaneous lighting stroke, surging, etc. According to the actual outdoor situation, necessary protection measures must be taken, besides ensuring the electrical safety.

- The distance between signal transmission wires and High-voltage equipment or high-voltage cable is at least 50m.
- Outdoor wiring should better be routed under eaves as much as possible.
- In the open field, wiring should be buried underground in sealed steel pipe, and the steel-pipe should be one-point grounding. Overhead routing method is forbidden.
- In strong thunderstorm area or high induction voltage areas (such as high-voltage transformer substation), high power lightning protection apparatus and lightning conductor are necessary to be added.
- The design of lightning protection and grounding of the outdoor devices and cables should be considered together with the lightning protection demand of buildings. It also must conform to the related national standards and industrial standards.
- The system should be equipotential grounded. The grounding equipment must conform to the demands of system anti-jamming and electrical safety both and it must not appear short circuit or mixed circuit with the zero conductor of strong grid. When the system is grounded alone, the resistance should be no more than 4Ω. The sectional area of the grounding cable should be no less than 25mm2. For grounding instructions, refer to the Installation Manual of Camera.




Figure A.3.1 Lightning & Surge Protection

Grounding for Cement Pole/Wall Installation:

When the camera is installed in environment where is relatively insulating to the earth, e.g., cement pole or cement wall, then only the control center requires proper grounded locally. Refer to the following figure.




Figure A.3.2 Grounding in Cement Pole/Wall Installation

Notes:

- Because the signal transmission media of fiber optical camera and camera are isolated from the control center, they must be grounded locally to protect camera against damages.
- If the camera is installed in strong thunderstorm area, it must be grounded locally to release lightening or suchlike high energy to protect camera against damages. Refer to the following figure.




Figure A.3.3 Lightening-protection Grounding in Cement Pole/Wall Installation

Grounding for Metal Pole Installation:

When the camera is installed in environment where is conductive to the earth, e.g., metal pole, then the grounding of camera can be achieved by the properly grounded metal pole, meanwhile, the control center must be grounded locally as well. Refer to the following figure.




Figure A.3.4 Grounding in Metal Pole Installation

Note:

If the fiber optics, lightening protector or other device are applied during the transmission of camera, such devices as well as the video cables routing through must be proper grounded.

Appendix 3 Waterproof

Notes:

- The long-arm wall mount is recommended for the outdoor application of camera.
- You cannot use the short-arm wall mount or pendant mount for outdoor application, because it is not water-proof.
- It is recommended to use the mount with inner threaded interface and good waterproof performance.
- If you use a mount with outer threaded interface, adopt waterproof measures to the adapter applied between the mount and the camera.
- Do not install indoor camera to the outdoor environment.

L-shape Pole Mount

Make sure that the L-shape pole mount is designed with a certain inclination angle as shown in following figure. Water won't flow from the pole into the camera with the inclination angle.




Figure A.4.1 Customized Mount

Appendix 4 Bubble Maintenance

The bubble is a transparent plastic. The dust, oil and finger print, etc. will cause scratch or image blur. Refer to the following method to clean the bubble.

Handling dust

Use oil free soft brush or blowing dust ball to clean the dust.

Handling oil

Steps:

- 1. Wipe off the water-drop or oil by soft cloth and dry the bubble.
- 2. Use oil free cotton cloth to wipe the bubble with alcohol or detergent.
- 3. Change the cloth to wipe the bubble until the bubble is clean.

Appendix 5 RS-485 Bus Connection

General Property of RS-485 Bus

According to RS-485 industry bus standard, RS-485 is a half-duplex communication bus which has 120Ω characteristic impendence, the maximum load ability is 32 payloads (including controller device and controlled device).

RS-485 Bus Transmission Distance

When using 0.56mm (24AWG) twisted-pair line, according to different baudrate, the maximum transmission distance theory table is shown as below:

Max. Distance of RS-485 Transmission		
Baudrate Max Distance

9600BPS	800m	

The transmission distance will be decreased if we use the thinner cable, or use this product under the strong electromagnetic interference situation, or there are lots of devices are added to the bus; on the contrary, the transmission distance will be increased.

Connection Methods

RS-485 industry bus standard require daisy-chain connection method between any devices, both sides have to connect a 120Ω terminal resistance (show as Diagram 1), the simplified connection method is shown as diagram 2, but the distance of "D" should not be too long.




Figure A.6.1 RS-485 Connection 1




Figure A.6.2 RS-485 Connection 2

Problems in the Practical Application

Normally, users adopt star-shape connection method in construction, under this situation, the terminal resistors must be connected between two farthest devices (as Figure A-9, 1# and 15#), but this connection method does not satisfy the requirement of the RS-485 industry standard so that it will lead to some problems such as signal reflection, anti-jamming ability decline when the devices are faraway. At this time, the camera will be uncontrollable, or self-running, etc.




Figure A.6.3 Star Shape Connection

For such case, the best way is adding a RS-485 distributor. This product can effectively change the star-shape connection to which satisfies the requirement of RS-485 industry standard, in order to avoid those problems and improve the communication reliability. Refer to the following figure.




Figure A.6.4 RS-485 Distributor

Appendix 9 Alarm In/Out Connections

Note:

This section is only for the cameras with alarm in/out functions.

The camera can be connected with alarm inputs ($0^{\sim}5VDC$) and alarm outputs. Refer to the following diagrams for alarm output:




Figure A.9.1 Alarm Out Connections

The alarm provides the relay output (no voltage), and the external power supply is required when it connects to the alarm device.

- For DC power supply (left diagram), the input voltage must be no more than 30VDC, 1A.
- For AC power supply, the external relay must be used (right diagram) to prevent damages to the camera and avoid risk of electric shock.

Appendix 10 Camera Function Description

Note:

The functions vary depending on different camera models.

Limit Stops

The camera can be programmed to move within the limit stops (left/right, up/down).

Scan Modes

The camera provides 5 scan modes: auto scan, tilt scan, frame scan, random scan and panorama scan.

Preset Freezing

This feature freezes the scene on the monitor when the camera is moving to a preset. This allows for smooth transition from one preset scene to another. It also guarantees that masked area will not be revealed when the camera is moving to a preset.

Presets

A preset is a predefined image position. When the preset is called, the camera will automatically move to the defined position. The presets can be added, modified, deleted and called.

Label Display

The on-screen label of the preset title, azimuth/elevation, zoom, time and camera name can be displayed on the monitor. The displays of time and camera name can be programmed.

Auto Flips

In manual tracking mode, when a target object goes directly beneath the camera, the video will automatically flips 180 degrees in horizontal direction to maintain continuity of tracking. This function can also be realized by auto mirror image depending on the models of camera.

Privacy Mask

This function allows you to block or mask certain area of a scene, for preventing the personal privacy from recording or live viewing. A masked area will move with pan and tilt functions and automatically adjust in size as the lens zooms telephoto and wide.

3D Positioning

In the client software, use the left key of mouse to click on the desired position in the video image and drag a rectangle area in the lower right direction, then the camera system will move the position to the center and allow the rectangle area to zoom in. Use the left key of mouse to drag a rectangle area in the upper left direction to move the position to the center and allow the rectangle area to zoom out.

Proportional Pan/Tilt

Proportional pan/tilt automatically reduces or increases the pan and tilt speeds according to the amount of zoom. At telephoto zoom settings, the pan and tilt speeds will be slower than at wide zoom settings. This keeps the image from moving too fast on the live view image when there is a large amount of zoom.

Auto Focus

The auto focus enables the camera to focus automatically to maintain clear video images.

Day/Night Auto Switch

The cameras deliver color images during the day. And as light diminishes at night, the cameras switch to night mode and deliver black and white images with high quality.

Slow Shutter

In slow shutter mode, the shutter speed will automatically slow down in low illumination conditions to maintain clear video images by extending the exposure time. The feature can be enabled or disabled.

Backlight Compensation (BLC)

If you focus on an object against strong backlight, the object will be too dark to be seen clearly. The BLC

(Backlight Compensation) function can compensate light to the object in the front to make it clear, but this causes the over-exposure of the background where the light is strong.

Wide Dynamic Range (WDR)

The wide dynamic range (WDR) function helps the camera provide clear images even under back light circumstances. When there are both very bright and very dark areas simultaneously in the field of view, WDR balances the brightness level of the whole image and provide clear images with details.

White Balance (WB)

White balance can remove the unrealistic color casts. White balance is the white rendition function of the camera to adjust the color temperature according to the environment automatically.

Patrol

A patrol is a memorized series of pre-defined preset function. The scanning speed between two presets and the dwell time at the preset are programmable.

Pattern

A pattern is a memorized series of pan, tilt, zoom, and preset functions. By default the focus and iris are in auto status during the pattern is being memorized.

Power Off Memory

The camera supports the power off memory capability with the predefined resume time. It allows the camera to resume its previous position after power is restored.

Time Task

A time task is a preconfigured action that can be performed automatically at a specific date and time. The programmable actions include: auto scan, random scan, patrol 1-8 ,pattern 1-4, preset 1-8,frame scan, panorama scan, tilt scan, day, night, reboot, PT adjust, Aux Output, etc.

Park Action

This feature allows the camera to start a predefined action automatically after a period of inactivity.

User Management

The camera allows you to edit users with different levels of permission, in the admin login status. Multiple users are allowed to access and control the same camera via network simultaneously.

3D Digital Noise Reduction

Comparing with the general 2D digital noise reduction, the 3D digital noise reduction function processes the noise between two frames besides processing the noise in one frame. The noise will be much less and the video will be clearer.

Dual-VCA

Combine the detected VCA information into the video stream, which can be used for the second-time analysis on the back-end device.
